

AVID's mission

AVID's mission is to close the achievement gap by preparing all students for college readiness and success in a global society.

What is AVID?



AVID is a program for “middle to upper middle” academic students. These students have potential for honors and AP work in high school but need academic and emotional support paired with the rigor. Students have an AP/Honors class and AVID course to support.



AVID combines rigor with support that includes the student’s own individual determination and the support of teachers, other AVID students and their families, the AVID teacher, and university tutors.



Students must maintain 2.0 or higher GPA throughout the school year

Has academic potential


- Average to high test scores

The AVID Elective student profile


Meets one or more of the following criteria:

What is Academic Rigor?

Rigor is the goal of helping students develop the capacity to understand content that is complex, ambiguous, provocative, and personally or emotionally challenging.


Why Rigor?

Rigorous curriculum is a greater factor in determining college graduation rates than class standing, standardized test scores, or grade point average.

Meeting the challenge

- Develop as **readers and writers**
- Develop deep **content knowledge**
- Know content specific **strategies** for reading, writing, thinking, and talking
- Develop **habits, skills, and behaviors** to use knowledge and skills


AVID Graduates

- 91.3 percent plan to enroll in a college or university
 - 58.3 percent plan to enroll in a four-year university
 - 33.0 percent to enroll in a two-year college

Completing college-entrance requirements

AVID students complete four-year college entrance requirements at a rate at least *two times higher* than the national rate.
