

What to Bring on PSAT 8/9 Day

There are only a few things you really need to bring on test day, and a lot of things you're better off leaving at home or in your locker. Be sure to bring:

- · Your fully charged device. You must have the Blue Book app installed and exam setup complete before test day if you're testing with a personal device.
- · A power cord and/or a portable charger. We cannot guarantee you'll have access to an outlet during testing. Your device should be able to hold a charge for 3–4 hours.
- · A sharpened pencil or pen.
- · Scratch paper will be provided do not bring your own.
- · An approved calculator. There's a graphing calculator built into the app, but you can bring your own if you like.
- · A drink with a lid and/or a snack (for your break).

What NOT to Bring on PSAT 8/9 Test Day

- · Backpack or bag
- · Phone, smart watch, iPad, AirPods, headphones, etc.
- · Notebooks, binders, books, etc.
- *If you have text-to-speech accommodations, you may bring your own corded headphones to use during testing. (Wireless/Bluetooth headphones are NOT allowed.)







Beginning with the 2024-2025 school year, students will NO LONGER be able to carry their large backpacks during the school day from class to class.

Backpacks have become a safety issue in both our hallways and classrooms.

Backpacks MUST remain in student lockers during the school day.



Students may carry a nylon drawstring tote. These hold a maximum of two books and/or the student's assigned laptop, and can hang on the back of student chairs.

Nylon drawstring totes will be available for purchase in The Chieftain Corner Store, or can be purchased at local retailers.



EVERY student must WEAR his or <u>her</u> student ID while on school grounds.

- · Student IDs must be worn and visible at all times.
- Student ID must be presented to any school staff member or person of authority upon request.
- The front and back of the ID cannot be altered. Defacing or altering the student ID is prohibited.
- · Wearing another student's ID card is prohibited.
- · Lost, stolen, altered, damaged, and/or defaced ID cards must be replaced immediately.

Students who fail to adhere to the above are subject to an <u>after school</u> detention and replacement fee.

If you are caught not wearing your badge in school 6 or more times, another badge will automatically be printed, and a \$5 fee will be placed on your student account to be paid. (EVEN IF YOU ALREADY HAVE A BADGE)

Lunch Deliveries : REMINDER



Food Deliveries: Food that is delivered by a service such as Door Dash or Grub Hub will not be permitted at Eppler. due to school safety concerns and the disruption to the school day, we cannot accommodate such deliveries. we ask that all students bring their own lunch or buy a lunch from the cafeteria. If a student forgets their lunch, they may borrow against their lunch account in the cafeteria, or a parent may drop off a lunch for their

student. However, if the food dropped off is from a restaurant, the student will be asked to eat it in the Main Office during their lunch hour. Coffee, smoothies, and outside breakfast brought in the school in the morning must be consumed before going into first hour. This is the practice that takes place at the high school level and Eppler is aligning with Utica High in order to provide consistent expectations for our students. Early Dismissal Procedures

We have a new process for early dismissals. When you arrive at Eppler please ring the bell at our Main Office door, let us know your student's name, show your id to the camera and we will let you in to our vestibule. With your cell phone please scan the QR code on the red "Scan For Early Dismissal" poster on the wall, type in the information requested, and we will call your student down to leave with you.

STUDENTS: You must come through the front office to exit the school.

How to Report an Absence

- When a student is going to be absent, parents/guardians should report the absence before the school day begins. Calls to the attendance line can be made 24 hours a day, seven days a week. The Shelby Attendance Line is **586-797-2799**. Absences will be input to PowerSchool by 4:00 pm on the date of the absence.
- Per UCS policy, the following reasons for an absence will be accepted as an excused absence; student illness, hospitalization, doctor ordered bed rest, mandatory court appearance, death in the immediate family, family vacation, medical appointments and administrative permission. **All other absences will be unexcused.**




Overview

- Through the implementation of the 2023 bond issue, UCS is addressing long-standing issues within attendance areas that were largely developed 50 years ago.
- Currently, DeKeyser Elementary is under reconstruction. During the next two years, reconstruction will occur at Havel Elementary and Graebner Elementary.
- The following changes are being made under a plan for select schools in the Henry Ford II elementary feeder pattern:
 - Consolidation of the Browning Elementary attendance areas into Havel Elementary and Graebner Elementary.
 - Additional changes that follow the natural boundary of the Clinton River for the Havel Elementary attendance areas. Portions of Oakbrook and DeKeyser Elementary schools – which are separated from the schools by the Clinton River – will be combined with contiguous Havel Elementary communities.
 - A portion of Havel Elementary School where students cross Schoenherr Road will be merged with the neighboring Graebner Elementary community, which is closer in proximity to the neighborhood.
 - A small portion of Graebner Elementary in Macomb Township that is disconnected from its attendance area will be merged with a contiguous Ebeling Elementary neighborhood.

Attendance Area Updates

Below are current and revised attendance areas <u>scheduled for fall of 2027</u>. The attendance revision is made in conjunction with planned reconstruction at Havel Elementary and Graebner Elementary. The reconstruction work is part of a long-term vision for our schools that is focused on safety and designs that support innovation, growth and achievement. The revised attendance areas provide more students access to reconstructed elementary schools and reconnect communities.

- 6-We will do the best we can to accommodate other requests but there may be some limitations. For questions, please call our food service office at 586-797-1180


