"My mom really likes it," said third grader, Eva Khammo, about the safety improvement that separates cars from bus drop off.

The West Utica improvements are among construction projects that took place at 21 sites this summer based on the program's focus areas: enhancing safety, improving technology and

addressing the long-range facility needs of Michigan's second-largest school district.

"Throughout this bond issue, we have managed our resources carefully to make sure we are extending the impact of the improvements," Superintendent Robert Monroe said.

"Through the leadership of the Board of Education, we have strategically sold the bonds to secure favorable interest rates, obtained improved credit ratings, bid the projects competitively, and effectively scheduled and managed the upgrades to meet our commitment to UCS taxpayers."

Five UCS Students Named Among Nation's Top One Percent of High School Seniors

Five Utica Community Schools students are among only 16,000 U.S. seniors to be named 2023 National Merit semifinalists.

UCS National Merit Semi-finalists are: Nisha Koshy, Tejaswi Krishnan and Andrew Munya, of the Gene L. Klida Utica Academy for International Studies and Hailey Nightingale and Lukas Zahuranic, of Eisenhower High School.

National Merit Semi-finalists are among the top one percent of the nation's high school seniors.

More than 1.6 million students of the Class of 2023 entered the National Merit Program by taking the 2021 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test. The

nationwide pool of semi-finalists includes the highest scoring entrants in each state.

To move from semi-finalist to finalist status, students must submit a detailed scholarship application. The application includes information about their academic record, participation in school and community activities, demonstrated leadership, an essay, record of consistently high academic performance, a recommendation by an official of their high school and SAT scores that confirm their PSAT/NMSQT performance.

Finalists have an opportunity to continue in the competition for 7,500 National Merit Scholarships totaling \$28 million next spring.

It is also responsible for overseeing the benefits to Macomb County residents, such as providing feedback to student curriculum development, senior programs and community collaboration.
