Michigan's safe storage law requires homeowners to safely store a weapon when a minor is likely to be present. Our police departments are supporting this law by providing safety kits to gun owners free of charge. Please contact your local police department to receive a free gun safety kit.

We are proud to serve a community that has such high expectations for student success. By continuing to work together, we will provide UCS students with a safe community where they can grow and are empowered to transform their lives and the future.
